Dear Church.

But so too is the desperate desolation of Christ's arrest, the pain and injustice of the crucifixion, and the hours of waiting until we can sing "Alleluia" on Easter. I look forward to seeing you along the way—during Thursday's dinner and Tenebrae service, on Friday at the GKEP noon-time service, and at our own Easter morning service in the Sanctuary. Easter is the most important day of the year for Christians because it serves as a reminder of the power of God's love—a power that Christ's resurrection tells us is greater than death. I am grateful that in our part of the world we experience Easter during the springtime. As the flowers are beginning to bloom and the landscape begins to show new colors I am reminded that new life abounds everywhere!

However, I often find it challenging to hold onto the joy of Easter because it is easily lost in the clutter and "busy-ness" of life. Blessings to all of you during this Holy week!



is an organization that works to build community by trying to fill some gaps in food security and other basic needs for our families in Kirkland. They help identify gaps (through school counselors) while they seek more sustainable solutions for these kids and their families. They help hungry Kirkland kids by providing a box of food for over the school breaks for ALL Kirkland elementary schools with need.

The next school break is Spring Break (April 1st-9th). That means donors provide for over 200 boxes of food – helping over 150 families! Each box is under \$50.00 with a standard menu of items. Our neighbors struggle more than we think; but, together, we can help to fill real needs.

This Spring Break, KCC will provide 4 food boxes to Kirkland Nourishing Network for kids and their families. We will be using remaining food you donated in February along with funds from our Common Cents Fund to purchase missing items. Our food boxes will be delivered on March 29th to the distribution center.

This is another example of how the coins you drop into the Common Cents basket on Sunday morning are working on your behalf for the children in our community. Thank you for your continued support.



The Season of Easter

The purple of Lent does not last forever. Easter arrives, dressed in white and gold, and with a flurry of Alleluias. We celebrate with the disciples that Jesus is alive in a new way,

and we move toward Pentecost when we welcome the Holy Spirit.

The experience of Easter and the days that follow are at the same time personal and communal. Jesus has individual encounters with some of his disciples (Mary Magdalene, Thomas) after the Resurrection, but he encourages them – and all of his disciples – to go and share his message of love, justice, and peace with the whole world. As the disciples go about laying the foundation of the early church, Jesus urges them to remember his commandments, gather in unity, and lean on the Holy Spirit as a guide.



"I have seen the Lord" (John 20:1-18). "...they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid" (Mark 16:1–8). In this year, we have two gospel stories of the Resurrection from which to choose. In John's gospel, Mary Magdalene has an encounter with the risen Christ. In Mark, the women see the empty tomb and are told by "a young man, dressed in a white robe"



that they will see Jesus in Galilee. In John, Mary announces what she has seen; and in Mark, the women run away.

Together this week

- *Read both stories side-by-side and simply reflect on the differences.
- *Share stories about the most amazing thing that has ever happened to you.
- *What is the biggest surprise in each one's life?
- *How does it feel to be so completely taken unaware?

In the stories of Jesus' resurrection, we read about Jesus doing amazing things, even walking through locked doors!



And yet, Jesus' friends recognize him and were overjoyed to be with him once more. Jesus understands Thomas' need for proof and is gentle with Thomas. In this passage, we receive the gifts of Easter – peace and the Holy Spirit – and are charged with the Easter task of forgiving. These were gifts for the first disciples and now are given to us.

Where is Jesus' presence alive for you?

What can you do to welcome Jesus' presence?

How can we make Jesus' presence known and felt by others?

Luke 24:36b-48


