From our Pastor:

Dear Church,

The beginning of Spring has come and I have been rejoicing that it has started with a few days of bright and warm weather. Of course, the weather forecast promises rain in the near future, reminding me that Spring will include many rain-filled days. However, as we wander through this season of Lent, peering eagerly toward Easter, I am always grateful for sun-filled days which announce the promise of new life and seem to set the table for Easter.

And I must admit that I need these reminders. I need them because often about now whatever Lenten discipline I have set for myself begins to feel rather weighty. Add that to the work of household spring cleaning that is calling my name and the journey of Holy Week activities that are just on the horizon, and suddenly my own Lenten invitation to "examine and expand my relationship with God" feels too heavy and too close to the heart. I suspect I am not alone in saying that part way through Lent I often find myself 'done' with the season. However, I must trek along through the season with sunlight and random inspiration leading my way.

This year a quote by the Franciscan priest and spiritual contemplative Richard Rohr has been particularly instructive and has, thus far, kept me from my normal mid-Lent crash. Rohr writes:

"Most of us were taught that God would love us **if and when we change.** (*emphasis mine*) In fact, God loves you so that you can change. What empowers change, what makes you desirous of change is the experience of love. It is that inherent experience of love that becomes the engine of change."

Rohr's words have powerfully landed on my heart and I have heard them as an invitation, of sorts. I often enter Lent wanting to explore and pick at the places of doubt, fear, and discomfort that creep up in my faith life, hoping that if I can identify them, that I will somehow know myself and God more completely. Yet, Rohr's words feel like they are calling me to identify the places where I can see and experience love and thus, I might know how to grow and change. Certainly, self-examination is an important component of our faith work, but I wonder if I (we) don't often forget that our Lenten journey does not have to be marked by solitude. In fact, it might be more fruitful if we are looking up and out, rather than solely looking inside of ourselves!



Living the Season Of Lent



The Season of Lent can be a time of transformation and growth. In our busy world, there are few opportunities to slow down and rest in God's love. Lent can provide the opportunity to catch our breath and be still in God's presence. It is a deepening time when we reflect on our relationship with God and the awareness of our hope in Christ.

April 7, 2019 ~ 5th Sunday of Lent The Fragrance of Life

Acts 5:27–32 Psalm 118:14–29 or Psalm 150 Revelation 1:4–8 **John 20:19–31**



Something to think about, talk about or do

Some things are worth giving all that we have and all that we are. Six days before the Passover, Jesus and his disciples visit the home of Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. Mary takes expensive perfume, pours it on Jesus' feet and wipes them with her hair. Mary's act is extravagant and beautiful. Mary ministers to Jesus in a way that mirrors the way he has ministered to her and her loved ones, but also to what he will do for all in his extravagant, self-giving love.

Together

**Identify someone in your community that might be feeling tired or discouraged. Pack a gift bag with a small gift and a beautiful card signed by each person in your household.

**Light some scented candles or oil, and let the fragrance fill the room.

**How might we respond to the extravagant self-giving love of Jesus?

**In what ways might we minister to Jesus, today?

**How can our actions fill the world with the fragrance of God's love?

Something to think about, talk about or do

This week, we watch as Jesus enters Jerusalem. The excited crowd shouts, "Blessed is the one that comes in the name of God!" If the people stop their proclamations, then even the stones will cry out. However, we know that later in this Holy

However, we know that later in this Holy Week, Jesus will be put to death. Those who cannot bear the message of God's love will try to put an end to it. But death is not the final answer. Jesus came to proclaim a message that cannot be

silenced. Next week, a stone rolled away from an empty tomb will cry that God's love is greater than anything else in the world.

Together

**Think about things that people might cry out in hope today or things that people might cry out in praise. Write these words on sticky notes and attach them to stones.

**Collect symbols of Holy Week such as a palm frond or fern frond, silver coins, bread, wine, cross, thorns, linen cloth. Use the symbols to retell the stories of Jesus' last days in Jerusalem.

**Provide drawing and writing materials for family members to express their feelings if they wish.

**Plan to attend Holy Week services at your church or another church in your community.

Easter

On Easter morning, we are reminded that violence, destruction, and death do not have the last say. The empty tomb is the first witness that God has done a new thing and the season erupts with joyful alleluias.

The Season of Easter is fifty days long and leads to Pentecost Day when the church celebrates the gift of God's spirit.

Throughout the Easter season, we will meet witnesses of God's new way.

Something to think about, talk about or do

Mary visits the tomb of Jesus and sees that the stone has been removed, so she runs to get Simon Peter and another disciple. Peter and the other disciple run to the tomb and discover that Jesus' body is missing. They do not entirely understand what happened, and they return home. But Mary is sad and confused. She stays outside the tomb crying and has a conversation with someone she thinks is the gardener. But, when he says her name, Mary realizes it is her special teacher, Jesus. Mary leaves the tomb to spread the news: Jesus is alive in a new way.

Together

**Make some shakers by placing small glass beads, small stones, and seeds in plastic eggs. Seal eggs with strong tape. Use your shakers to accompany you as you sing joyful Easter songs.

**Look for signs of new life in your household and world. Use the shakers to give praise each time something is mentioned.

**Making an Easter tree is an old European custom. Put a bare branch in a pot. Decorate with symbols of new life such as butterflies, flowers, and eggs.

Prayer

Look for signs of new life in your household, your community, and in Creation.

Name the signs one at a time and respond with the words, "We praise you, O God!" as you sound the shakers.

April 28, 2019 ~Love's Disruptive Witness

Acts 5:27-32

Psalm 118:14–29 or Psalm 150 Revelation 1:4–8 John 20:19–31



Something to think about, talk about or do

The stories of Jesus now turn to the stories of the community of Jesus' followers. This unfolding story does not come without conflict. Today we read of a hostile episode involving the authorities of the day. The apostles are asked to account for their disobedience to an earlier edict banning teaching in the name of Jesus. Peter defends the apostles' witness on the basis of "obeying" God. Obedience is simply a matter of priority. Faithful obedience puts first things first. In the midst of their unfolding experiences of God, the community answers the call of the Spirit to witness to God's life-giving, and disruptive ways.

Together

 $\ensuremath{^{**}\text{Be}}$ witnesses to Jesus' love. Use pavement

chalk to announce the good news. Write Easter messages and draw pictures of new life.

**Light a candle to symbolize the message of good news. Tell about a time you heard the story of Jesus. Where are the places where sharing the story of Jesus may be hard?

Prayer

O God, we are thankful for Jesus who taught us how to live in loving ways.

May we be witnesses to this love so others will know this love, too. Amen.

For our Lenten Journey...

Teresa of Avila (1515–1582) was born in Spain and as an eighteen year-old woman she entered a Carmelite convent. There she earned a reputation as a mystic, reformer, and writer who experienced visions of the divine and ministered to many. Later she founded a convent and wrote *The Way of Perfection* as a guide for her nuns. Her *Autobiography* and *The Interior Castle* remain beloved spiritual guidebooks.

Christ Has No Body is probably her most famous writing as it speaks powerfully of our own unique calls in service of the gospel. I think it also serves as a pick-me-up whenever our faith is battered or beleaguered.
