#### From our Pastor:

Dear Church,

Welcome to 2019! I hope you had a joyous Christmas and that the hope and peace of the Christ-child's birth continue to guide you into the new year!

On January 6<sup>th</sup> we will be celebrating Epiphany in worship. Epiphany is the celebration of the church that bears witness to the revelation of Jesus' to the world as celebrated by the visit from the Magi. Epiphany marks the end of the 12 days of Christmas and this year Epiphany actually falls on a Sunday. To add to our worship, I invite you to bring your Magi (or Wise ones) from any nativity sets you have and they will be placed on a table at the front of the sanctuary during worship to help us imagine the Magi coming to bring gifts to Jesus.

On January 20<sup>th</sup> we will be worshiping at Lake Washington Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in celebration of the Week of Christian Unity. **Their church address is 343 15<sup>th</sup> Avenue in Kirkland and worship will begin at 10am on that day**. As you may remember we hosted this service last January, and this year the Rev. Kara Markell and the Lake Washington Christian Church community are welcoming us to their building. Our worship will celebrate Christian Unity and the sermon will be brought by the Rev. Paul Benz, who is the Co-Director of the Faith Action Network. I hope you will plan to join in this celebration of partnership and faith!

I also want to remind all of you that immediately following our worship service on January 27<sup>th</sup> we will have our Annual Congregational Budget Meeting. The primary agenda item will be to pass our 2019 Annual Budget. As specified in our bylaws you will receive the budget in the mail in advance of the meeting. Attendance at this meeting is important so that we have enough people to fulfill our quorum requirement, but also because the approval of the budget is meant to be an act of faith and covenant by the congregation.

Finally, as we enter into a new year I would like to leave you with these benediction words written by Cheryl Lawrie:

take faith with you as you go;

### Something to think about, talk about or do

Everything needs water to live – humans, plants, animals. Of all the things that make up our bodies, we are more water than anything else. Just as we cannot imagine life without water, we cannot imagine life without God's love, either.

Because Jesus brought God's love to us in such a special way, we often speak of Jesus as being "living water." On this Sunday, we recall the story of John baptizing Jesus in the Jordan River, and how God said to Jesus at the moment of baptism, "You are very special to me. I love you."

We often write our names on the things we love most so that everyone will know they are ours. We try to take very special care of those things, and we worry if they get lost or damaged. Baptism is like that. It's like God writing God's name onto us.

### Something to think about, talk about or do

This story is about celebrating life, and how God wants to help us do that. In those days it would have been a sign of very bad hospitality to run out of anything to serve one's guests, and so Jesus saved the host from certain shame by providing more wine. Not only that, Jesus provided the best! It's surprising, too, because the people in charge do not know from where the wine comes. The servants do. Jesus came to the rescue when it wasn't his responsibility, offering lavish hospitality that was unexpected and glorious.

God's love is like that. It's extravagant, abundant, always more than enough. It tastes better than we could ever hope for or expect. It's like having a wonderful, delicious, extravagant dessert at the end of a casual, simple meal. We can choose to question it or doubt it, or – just for once – we can simply indulge. Through the turning of the water into wine, Jesus is revealed. This miracle speaks of God bringing extravagance and abundance into everyday activities. God's glory is revealed, and the disciples believe in Jesus. The world – or at least the world of this wedding party – has been turned around. All because of Jesus.

## Something to think about, talk about or do

What is the most important part of the body? That would depend on what one is wanting to do. If listening to music, the ear is important.

If going for a walk, the legs and feet are important. If scratching an itch, you might need your finger, your hand, your arm to reach to the place that itches, your elbow so your arm could bend, and your brain to know where the itch was. In other words, all parts of the body have a role at different times for different things. Long ago, Paul wrote to the church in Corinth and reminded them that the church – the Body of Christ – is also made up of different parts, each of which has different talents, different skills, and different tasks to do. And all of which are just as important as each other. Singing in the choir, praying, folding worship bulletins, welcoming people to worship, preaching the sermon, teaching, speaking out about injustice, listening when someone is hurting... are all important. We all make up the church.
