From our Pastor:

Pentecost is the day in the religious calendar when we celebrate the arrival of the Holy Spirit as a gift to the disciples. This gift transforms the disciples into teachers and leaders rather than followers and it is through this gift and through the leadership of the Apostles that the early church is formed. This year Pentecost falls on June 9, which is the last day our church program year and the date of our Annual Meeting.

Often, partially because Pentecost comes the end of the church program year, we end up glossing over the importance of the Holy Spirit. This also happens because the Holy Spirit is mystical, hard to define, and variously described in the bible, which leads many of us to skip past Pentecost for fear of wrongly naming the Holy Spirit and its meaning. As I was looking for a concise way to describe the Holy Spirit I came across a poem simply entitled Pentecost, written by the English poet William Blake:

Pentecost

Unless the eye catch fire,
The God will not be seen.
Unless the ear catch fire
The God will not be heard.
Unless the tongue catch fire
The God will not be named.
Unless the heart catch fire,
The God will not be loved.
Unless the mind catch fire,
The God will not be known.

Blake's poem describes the faculties and senses of the body as the receiver of the Holy Spirit and implores the body to experience the presence of the Spirit in order to know God. I share this poem because it is a reminder that Pentecost wasn't merely an event that happened to the early church... it is an event that continues to happen today as well. But only if we allow ourselves to catch fire as the Spirit comes to us—in eyes open to see the fire of divine presence, in ears open to hear the needs of God's children, in tongues ready to speak truth, in hearts afire with love, and with minds open to be changed by the holy fire of God's presence.

It is no small thing that our church's Annual Meeting will be held on Pentecost. Our meeting may feel like a routine or even unimportant gathering, because the only item on the agenda is to elect our council leadership for the coming year. However, we are electing these leaders because they will be the ones to help uncover the movement of the Spirit in our midst and guide us as we respond. (continued on page 5)

During the Summer

Ideas for nurturing faith and discipleship at home during the Summer:

Perhaps during the Summer months, you are not able to participate in church activities regularly. Or maybe you are looking for faith experiences to share together at home. Or you might be a grandparent or other relative who wants to include faith conversations in your time with the children in your life. Whatever your particular circumstance, this resource will help you nurture faith and discipleship at home. "Living the Seasons at Home" provides a weekly engagement of a focus passage from the lectionary. These passages will possibly be the same ones you hear in church on Sunday. Even as you set aside space and use special materials, Sacred Presence is always with us. Therefore, faith conversations can happen anytime and anywhere.

June 2: Haunting Claims of Freedom

Acts 16:16-34

Psalm 97

Revelation 22:12–14, 16–17, 20–21 John 17:20–26

Something to think about, talk about or do

Unexpected ministry arises when the gospel brings its followers into conflict with economic and judicial systems. Enacting the gospel's liberation can be costly. The details of the story paint a scene where escape seems impossible. Paul and Silas act in freedom. They sing. They pray. The mission the authorities intended to stop keeps its focus and adapts to its new locale. Prisoners and jailers listen, the gospel is proclaimed, and lives are transformed.

Together

The story of Paul and Silas in jail presents an opportunity to think about people in jails, prisons, and detention centers.

**Share stories of people you know who show courage in their faithful living.

**Find ways you can support one in your community – perhaps by giving them some games or other items. Or go online and learn about prisoners of conscience through an agency such as Amnesty International.

**How can you be supportive of their work?

Prayer

O God, we are thankful for the songs and stories of faith that fill us with courage. We pray for those who suffer when they follow in your way. Amen.

Come, Holy Spirit



June 9: Pentecost Sunday

Acts 2:1-21 or Genesis 11:1-9 Psalm 104:24-34, 35b Romans 8:14-17 or Acts 2:1-21 John 14:8-17, (25-27)

Something to think about, talk about or do

On the day of Pentecost, God's Spirit breaks into the world like a rush of wind and blaze of fire, filling the disciples with new power, new boldness, and new life. The Spirit acts to create a community of every language, culture, and nation. If the disciples needed any more convincing that their mission has scope beyond their group and nation, this experience proved it! Pentecost Sunday celebrates the animating and sustaining presence of God's spirit within the community of the church. The Spirit gives the church its mission and the power to undertake it. The church is truly the community of the spirit.

Together

Talk about people who have made God's love special! known to you in the way they live.

**To whom do you show God's love?

**Write all the names on a paper plate with markers or crayons. Cut the plate into a spiral. Start on the edge of the plate and cut around and around, moving inward until there's a small circle remaining at the end. Attach colored ribbons to the outside of the spiral. Tie a piece of yarn or string to the middle and hang the spiral

The Season After Pentecost

The Season after Pentecost is sometimes called Ordinary Time. Not ordinary as in "ho-hum" but ordinary because these Sundays are not attached to any special festival, such as Christmas or Easter.

In this ordinary time, we live in God's love, and we live out God's love. All of the stories we encounter in this season help us discover what it means to hear and live in God's way and discover how living faithfully every day can transform our lives.

God is with us every day. Every day is an opportunity to follow Jesus, to grow as disciples, to share God's love. That makes even the most ordinary day special!

June 16: - Wisdom Calls

Proverbs 8:1-4, 22-31

Psalm 8 Romans 5:1–5 John 16:12–15



Something to think about, talk about or do

the beginning of time, it was Wisdom who helped God order the cosmos and established the patterns that hold creation together. It is clear that Wisdom lives in community with God as a playful companion; Wisdom delights God and in turn finds joy in God's presence. Wisdom calls out to all God's children and longs to be heard. Will we listen?

Together this week

Consider how you can care for creation in your corner of the world. Brainstorm ways you can celebrate creation and offer thanks by protecting and preserving it. Try to carry out at least one of these ideas in the next week.

**Create blessing stars Draw stars and cut them out of paper. Write or draw on them all the blessings of creation you can think of: earth, birds, fish, animals, stars, moon, people, and so on. Tape a star or two to each mirror in your home. Each time any of you look into the mirror, you will see one of God's wonderful creations reflected in the mirror as well as the beautiful blessings of creation you have named on the star.

**Creation is an intricate design while at the same time incredibly vast.

Find a spider's web or a picture of one. Examine it closely. It looks delicate, yet it is strong enough to withstand wind and rain. Share thoughts about how a spider's web is a beautiful symbol for celebrating God's creation.

Prayer

Creator God, help us to hear Wisdom's voice and join the dance of caring for creation. Amen.

June 23: Deep Down Questions

1 Kings 19:1–4, (5–7), 8–15a Psalm 42 and 43 Galatians 3:23–29 Luke 8:26–39

Something to think about, talk about or do

Elijah was scared and ran away from trouble. He hid in a cave and waited, hoping to hear God. Elijah heard a wind strong enough to break rocks, but he did not hear God. There was an earthquake and a fire. Elijah listened for God in the roar and chaos but did not hear God. Then there was a silence, a stillness, and Elijah heard God in the stillness. Elijah heard God in the silence. God was always with Elijah even when Elijah did not realize it. Like Elijah, sometimes we have to be still and look deep down to discover that God is with us.

Together this week

Place a candle on a small table and light it. Surround it with small rocks and stones. Sit around the table and silently look at the flame and the stones. Try and see if everyone can sit in the silence for one minute. (Longer if it goes well!) **Talk about what that felt like. Share what each person was thinking during the silence.

Meal time —While having dinner, play an upbeat song from a favorite CD, then play a quiet song of instrumental music or nature sounds.

**Talk about the difference and preferences between the two pieces of music. You may want to try eating a meal in total silence and explore that experience.

Door hanger —Take a business-size envelope and make two holes in one of the short ends. Tie a string through the holes to make a hanger.

**Write on the envelope: "SHHH! I need time to sit in the quiet." Or draw a peaceful picture. Hang your creation on a bedroom door. You may wish to put small pieces of paper and crayons in the envelopes so that if someone comes by, they may leave a note.

Prayer

Thank you, God, for being with us all the time, especially when we are worn out. In moments of stillness, may we feel you near us giving us the strength that we need. Amen.

June 30: Take Up the Story

2 Kings 2:1–2, 6–14 Psalm 77:1–2, 11–20 Galatians 5:1, 13–25 Luke 9:51–62



Something to think about, talk about or do

In 2 Kings we hear of Elijah being taken up to heaven in a whirlwind. Elisha is left behind to take up Elijah's work, and Elisha is to share the story and add his own chapter to it.

Elisha asked for a share of Elijah's spirit so that Elisha could do this task more fully. This work and spirit were represented by a piece of cloth called a mantle.

When we pick up the story of God's love and pass it on, God's work in the world continues from generation to generation.

Together this week

Sharing stories —Do you have a favorite family story, perhaps one that

shared by more than one generation?
**Talk together about your family stories
that you would like to keep telling.

**Share what your family values are and how you would like to share in carrying out God's work in the world.

**Write these down and illustrate them. Place them in a container. Decorate it and label it the (name) family's mantle. It is a symbol of your story and work. Store it in a particular place. On special occasions or chosen dates, take out your mantle, read it, and add in new things. You may wish to take a piece of cloth and decorate it with markers or paint and wrap your container in it.

**Invite everyone to share one or more favorite Bible stories.

What do they like about this story? What does it tell them about God?

Prayer


Dear God, thank you for your love that we have received from others. Help us to pass your love to others. Amen.
