#### From our Pastor:

Dear Church,

Although the month of June marks the end of our program year and the shift into summer, the month is shaping up to be quite busy. The calendar includes bible presentations to our young people, a presentation about the planned permanent shelter for women and families with children, our June 10<sup>th</sup> Congregational Meeting and congregational barbeque, Ele N. helping to lead worship on June 17<sup>th</sup> with stories of her encounters with the Spirit, and finally, Pride Sunday on June 24<sup>th</sup>.

I am happy that we will be welcoming Ms. Karina O'. to worship on Sunday June 3rd. Karina is a member at Lake Washington United Methodist church where she organizes their Safe Parking program which provides a safe place for people living in their cars. She is also a board member at The Sophia Way, which focuses on assisting women who are dealing with homelessness on the Eastside. As a part of this work Karina has been instrumental in advocating for a permanent emergency shelter for women and families with children. Karina will be joining us to share about the permanent shelter project that is cited for property adjacent to the building that houses the Salt House church and The New Bethlehem Project. Plan to be in worship to hear about how we can help with this important project!

This summer you will notice a couple of changes in worship—both focused on our children. Beginning on June 17<sup>th</sup> we will have a carpeted area at the front right side of the sanctuary. Our children are invited to spend the morning up front quietly playing, reading, or coloring during worship. We don't have church school classes during the summer, but we want to make it clear that our children are welcome in worship...by creating a "home-y" space for them to enjoy during worship. Our nursery will still be available for our youngest children, but we want to say "welcome" to our older children as they come to worship and we hope that by offering this special place that our children will know that they have a place at their church home! Parents and older siblings are welcome (but not required) to enjoy this space too!

Over the summer our "Time for Young Disciples" will include a weekly element of surprise.



Beginning on June 17<sup>th</sup> our young disciples will be invited to take a turn (or 2) at putting an item in a 'Mystery Box' that will be opened at the beginning of the young disciples time. The item needs to be able to fit in the box and can't be a living animal or something that could be dangerous to have in worship…but other than that there are no rules! Upon opening the box to discover what is inside I will improvise a children's message based on what is hidden inside. Perhaps I will have a ready

answer for how to connect the uncovered item to God or perhaps I will find myself stumped—we'll see how that goes! At the end "Time for Young Disciples" I will give another person a chance to (continued on page 5)

# Living the Season after Pentecost



Trinity Sunday leads us from the red of Pentecost Sunday to the green growing time of the Season after Pentecost, which is also called Ordinary Time. But is there anything ordinary for those who invite the Spirit to lead them in new ways?

The Season after Pentecost is the longer season of the Christian year. It begins after the great celebration of Pentecost and continues until the Sunday before Advent. It is long. It is vibrant. It is active.

There are no big festival days within the season, so it would be easy to imagine it like a long, empty highway stretching out in front of us. But what seems like emptiness can be an invitation to special mindfulness and attention.

The traditional color of this season is green. In the natural world, green is a color of infinite variety – just think of how many shades of green can be found on a single tree or in one small field. When we start paying special attention, we see green everywhere in all of its differences and variations. It's the same with the stories of this season. When we start paying special attention to the stories of ordinary lives and relationships, we begin to see the variety of tones and hues of God's presence.

# Something to think about, talk about, or do

Deep inside and all around, Samuel heard God's call and said, "Your servant listens."
God calls people of all ages to be part of God's work in the world. No matter who we are, God knows us and calls us. God speaks.

### Together this week

Talk about and celebrate the people in your church who help you to listen for God's word. Think of a "listening practice" you might all engage with during the week, such as a breath prayer. You say a two-part prayer. When you breathe in, you think the first part. When you breathe out, you think the second part. (*Breathe in*) "Speak to me," (*breathe out*) "O God."

Any short prayer will work. Think the prayer in your mind or whisper it over and over. Soon you will do it without thinking.

Loving God, may your light shine in us as we travel this earth. Amen.

Samuel listens carefully – to the people and God. On the other hand, the people are impatient in their listening and want what they want when they want it. Sometimes we want something – even when we've been

cautioned that it is not good for us - so that we can be like others.

### Together this week:

Think of ways you have wanted something so that you can be like others.

How did that work out for you? Decide together what you might need to change so you can be authentically you – not like others.

### Prayer:

O God, we pray for leaders everywhere, we ask for your help for times when we are leaders, too. Amen.

# Something to think about, talk about, or do

Seven sons of Jesse pass by Samuel, but not one of them is the one God intends as future king. These seem to be all the sons Jesse feels necessary to present to Samuel. However, Samuel, knowing that God intends to pick one of Jesse's sons and has not yet done so, asks if there is another. It turns out there is one more, the youngest, who was busy tending to chores while the older sons were allowed to attend the sacrifice. Samuel anoints this almost overlooked youth before returning to Ramah.

### Together this week:

Take turns saying what qualities you see in one another. Not in outward appearances but the qualities within.

### Prayer:

God of grace and fresh beginnings, through all our senses you come to us, calling us to know you, and love you, and live for you. Help us to discern your call and grant us wisdom in our response. Amen.

### Kirkland Town Hall Meeting on Gun Safety & Community Safety

On Wednesday, June 20th, from 5:30 to 8:00 pm, the city of Kirkland will host a town hall. The meeting will be at the Lake Washington High School Theater - 12033 NE 80th St, Kirkland. This is in response to a resolution passed on May 1st by the Kirkland City Council, a resolution "setting forth the need for community dialogue and action on the topic of gun safety and community safety." All are urged to attend (you don't have to be a Kirkland resident).

The town hall is the first city action to engage the community in discussions about what the city might do to reduce gun violence. The Council is interested in community views on topics such as improved enforcement of existing regulations, education and training to support responsible firearm ownership, mental health support and initiatives, state and local legislation on firearms safety. In addition to the town hall, other methods of collecting input will be used. It's important to note that all points of view are welcome during these community dialogs.

### KCC UCC Camp Scholarship Fund 2018

Each year we make an effort to provide 50% of the camp registration fee for each camper from KCC UCC that attends a summer camp, and/or a retreat at either of our camp locations. This fund is available for all children, youth, and adults. In the past years, the fund has supported campers at Kid's Camp, Intermediate Camp, Junior High Camps, Senior High Camps, Family Camps, Women's Retreat, Men's Retreat, Confirmation Retreat, Regional and National Youth events.

The Outdoor Ministry Programs in our Pacific Northwest Conference of the United Church of Christ are among the best. Our Camp and Conference Centers of Pilgrim Firs near Port Orchard and N-Sid-Sen on Lake Coeur d'Alene, outside Coeur d'Alene. Last year, many KCC UCC adults, children, and youth attend a camp or retreat at one of our sites. Each one was offered a Camp Scholarship covering 50% of the registration fee. We want to be able to send our youth, our children, our adults, our families to the camp or retreat of their choice this year, but we need your help.

During the next few weeks, the Christian Education Committee will be accepting donations to the KCC Camp Scholarship Fund after church to reach our goal of \$1000.

Support your church family as they experience the wonders of the outdoors and explore their relationship to God,


