### From our Pastor:

Dear Church,

We are currently traveling along through the season of Lent and although it seems like we have barely washed away Ash Wednesday's ashes by end of this month we will be immersed in Holy Week. During this week we follow Jesus from his triumphant entry into Jerusalem on



Palm Sunday (March 25<sup>th</sup>) to the intimacy of the Maundy Thursday meal (March 29<sup>th</sup>), a meal that pushes him toward the precipice of his arrest; then we walk with Jesus in his final hours and death on Good Friday. As the shadow of the cross lingers we grieve Jesus' death until we awaken to the light of Easter (April 1<sup>st</sup>) and remember that death does not have the last word. The Lenten season and particularly Holy Week always feels like something we are hurtling

toward, and then it is something we hurtle through—feeling deeply its mixture of triumph, sadness, despair, and hope—emotions that leave me grappling with the meaning of my own faith. I hope that you will participate in our holy week services, hear our story once again, and find your faith deepened. (Please see page 3 for the services for Holy Week.)

At first glance it feels like something of a holy joke that Easter falls on the day we know as April Fools' Day. While the origin of April Fools' Day is widely attributed to Geoffrey Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, I wonder if an Easter link might not be more appropriate than we would first believe. For doesn't it seem like foolishness to believe that the horrible death of Jesus wasn't the end of his story? And yet, 2000 years later we still proclaim the story of an empty tomb. In 1 Corinthians Paul even writes of being "fools for Christ," and so I invite you to perhaps think about what kind of foolishness your faith is calling you to get involved with. A new prayer discipline? Joining our choir? Reaching out to begin reconciling a long-broken relationship? As Easter/April Fools Day approaches I invite you to embrace your inner fool!

I would like to share with you that last weekend I joined in a local gathering of the gun safety organization Moms Demand Action. This meeting was attended by nearly 400 people and was so large because of our community's desire to respond to gun violence in the wake of the Parkland

school shooting in Florida. In the aftermath of that shooting I noted in worship that I didn't feel I had words to properly address *yet another* instance of gun violence. But while I couldn't find words, I did find comfort in our community's desire to come together to respond to gun violence. I believe that supporting this organization and their work is a way that we can faithfully do so. Please check out

# Journey Through the Season of Lent



The Season of Lent takes us on a journey of discovery of God's presence throughout history and in our lives today. This year the Season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th, and lasts until Easter Sunday.

It is a season of quiet reflection when we bring our deep thoughts and feelings to God. Often people will observe Lent with something the church calls spiritual disciplines, such as prayer, meditation, fasting, and service to others.

What would help deepen your relationship with God and one another this season?

The Season of Lent is denoted by the color purple. Lent is a gift to us. A gift of slowing down, of quietness, of taking time to ponder and ask questions. Lent invites us into ourselves and our own wonderings. As we journey with Jesus, getting ever closer to the cross, we are encouraged to focus on the things that really matter to us; yes, Lent is a gift.

### March 4th – Third Sunday in Lent "Contemplate God's Glory"

Exodus 20:1-17

Psalm 19

1 Corinthians 1:18–25

John 2:13-22

### Something to think about, talk about, or do Psalm 19 begins with the bold claim that all the earth and all of its elements are not totally mysterious happenings nor are they the random act

of capricious gods, they are the direct result of God's continue activity and that everything that happens on earth proclaims God's glory. Within this context, God's law – God's way of life for the world – brings joy and light to all who live within it.

### Together this week

\*As a Lenten practice, look for God's glory around you.

\*Each day, write down examples of God's glory in your calendar or journal, or snap a photo with your mobile phone and post it to social media.

### Prayer

Wise God, you offer us wonderful ways to love. Thank you for caring for us so deeply.

# March 11th – Fourth Sunday in Lent "God's Love Is Steadfast"

In Psalm 107, we hear that God's love is for everyone. From every direction on Earth, God gathers us into safety. In return, we thank and praise God. Let us sing out our gratitude with joy.

### Something to think about, talk about, or do

There is a difference between keeping rules someone else

makes you follow and keeping rules you have chosen yourself. Sometimes, the Hebrews rebelled against God's rules and broke them. Jeremiah promised that God would make a covenant that they would keep because they wanted to, not because they had to. God's words in our hearts will draw us ever closer to the One who loves us so unconditionally.

### Together this week

\*Imagine a community where God's people know the promises of God "by heart" – where no one has to teach her or his neighbor to know the ways of God.

\*Imagine a relationship with God so warm that God's way is known, deep down and all around.

\*Talk about what things you might do each day to help remember God's loving ways.

Dear God, your ways are deep in our hearts. Thank you for asking us to share your love with others. Amen.

I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. Jesus shared in the human experience of thirst when he shared a drink with a Samaritan woman at the well.

\*Women and girls in Africa and Asia often spend more than 6 hours collecting water every day.

\*663 million people worldwide do not have regular access to clean water.

\*Rain collection cisterns and irrigation systems help communities mitigate drought conditions.

\*The water crisis in Flint, Michigan, brought to public attention the severe effects of contaminants in water supplies and the importance of good infrastructure.

### How can you help with this?

### What can you avoid consuming by drinking a glass of water instead?

Substitute your fancy coffee drink from a coffee shop for a glass of water; then donate the cost of the coffee drink to your prayer jar.

Maybe your drink of choice is a carbonated soft drink, a fancy hot chocolate; a specialized tea; a glass of wine...

What ever you frequently choose to consume, drink a glass of water instead and donate the funds you saved to your prayer jar.

If you feel that you really want that favorite beverage; then match the cost by donating to your prayer jar.

### Remember:

You are drinking water so others can have clean, safe water.

Just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me. Matthew 25: 40.



On Easter Sunday, April 1st, we will bring our jars back to church with the coins we have collected. Our Lenten donations will be given to the One Great Hour of Sharing to enable our brothers and sisters in faith to have access to clean and safe water both here in the United States and around the world. ### **Lenten Thank You Jars**

The Season of Lent begins on Wednesday, February 14th, "Ash Wednesday" continuing to Easter Sunday. Lent is a quiet time in which we make space for reflection, prayer, and self-examination. Our focus will be on prayer and how we can make improvements in our own lives as well as the lives of others.

Each year the funds we collect are given to the UCC One Great Hour of Sharing. One Great Hour of Sharing® is the Lenten Offering of the United Church of Christ that supports disaster, refugee, and development actions. This year, once again our focus is concerning WATER; safe clean water both here at home and abroad. We want to "tap" into that special focus with our Lenten Prayer Jars.

### Think of all the ways that you have used water so far today.

Did you take a shower this morning?
Did you flush your toilet?
Or wash your hands?
When you made, or ate breakfast, was water used?
How about when you cleaned up after the meal?

Now imagine walking many miles each morning to gather water for your family, knowing the water you were collecting was unclean and could make the members of your family sick.

Now let's imagine that each year for several months you don't have access to water because it was the dry season and your water source had dried up.

How would you get by? What parts of your daily routine would you have to abandon? How would you provide water for your family?


