From our Pastor:

Dear Church,

The few shady spaces in our yard are where the last remnants of our February snow still reside. The small plies of icy, dirt-encrusted snow no longer provide a blanket of beauty, but instead serve merely as a reminder of the chaos that this winter's snows brought to this region. Each time I see those small piles I am reminded of how this season's storms nudged us to remember we are not in control of all things. In many ways the snowfall and chaos it brought was the perfect preface to the season of Lent—especially Ash Wednesday. On Ash Wednesday, which falls on March 6 this year, we are asked to remember that although our lives are filled with many modern conveniences and complications, we all begin from the dust of the earth and we will all eventually return there. And so we will begin this season marked by ashes remembering this simple truth.

The season of Lent asks us to do some work to prepare ourselves for Easter, for we cannot really know the joy of Easter Day if we haven't on some level wrestled with the heart-ache, fear, doubt, or indifference that confronts us as we live our daily lives. This year, thanks to an idea shared on twitter by the Rev. April Fiet, we are inviting you to prepare for Easter by focusing daily on one word. As you hold that word close through your day we invite you to find something that represents that word in the world—in a picture, a poem, a song lyric, or some other representation. We invite you to share these representations or to collect them for yourself. Please see page 3 for the list of words. I will have a few examples for you on Sunday March 3rd to help inspire your creativity!

In preparing for Lent and Ash Wednesday I came across a spare and simple poem by the British poet Edwina Gately (edwinagately.com) that feels very much like a preface to Lent. You will find the poem on page 11.



We collected approximately 80 special food items and \$150 in cash donations for this year's February Mission Project.

Our goal was to provide 3 School Break Food Boxes for students in the Lake Washington School District through the Kirkland Nourishing Network. This was to support students and their families during the Mid-Winter Break in February.

Because of the snow storms, schools were closed the week of February 12, so the Food Box program was cancelled. We will save the donated items and the Common Cents Funds to provide 4 boxes of food for the Spring Break. Spring Break is the week of April 7-14.



Continuing the Season After Epiphany for One More Sunday

The Season after the Epiphany invites us to open ourselves to new insights, new understandings, and new ways.

March 3rd ~ Living in Glory

Exodus 34:29–35 Psalm 99 2 Corinthians 3:12–4:2 Luke 9:28–36, (37–43a)



Something to think about, talk about or do

The disciples had been faithfully following Jesus around as he preached, taught, and healed. They had watched him and knew they were in the company of someone extraordinary, yet even they were amazed by this experience. Jesus was there with Moses and Elijah, two of their greatest faith heroes. It was too good to believe, too good to leave, and too good to find the words to describe. If only faith were like this every day! If only we could sit in the presence of Jesus and other great people of faith, and bask in the mystery and glory of God. But we're about to move into the Season of Lent, preparing for Easter. This is a time when we prepare for the very unexpected nature of God's greatness. We cannot stay on a mountain forever, but the mountain gives us the hope to go on.

Together

This week on Shrove Tuesday (March 5th), have a pancake party.

- *Make some pancakes together. Include lots of special toppings, and talk together about the things you have done as a family over the last few months. Share together in a prayer of thanks.
- *Close the Season after the Epiphany by talking about how God's light and love have been shining through you, and how you have been able to show Christ's love to others.

Living the Season Of Lent



The Season of Lent can be a time of transformation and growth. In our busy world, there are few opportunities to slow down and rest in God's love. Lent can provide the opportunity to catch our breath and be still in God's presence. It is a deepening time when we reflect on our relationship with God and the awareness of our hope in Christ.

At the start of Lent, create a guiet place in your house – a sacred space where family members can go to read, reflect, meditate, tell stories, and meet with God.

March 10th ~ A Place of Justice and Grace

Deuteronomy 26:1-11 Psalm 91:1-2, 9-16 Romans 10:8b-13 Luke 4:1–13



Something to think about, talk about or do

As Lent begins, we remember that all we have comes from God. In a land of plenty, the people Philippians 3:17-4:1 might be tempted to forget that God provides Luke 13:31-35 and cares for them.

In Deuteronomy, we read that the people are asked to bring the first fruits of the harvest to say "thanks" for all God has done. This also helps them remember that God is with them always. God asks that we share with others from the best we have, not from what is "left over."

**Light a candle and think about how God has blessed you. What stories about God and God's love will you remember and pass on? **Using a variety of art supplies, decorate a shoebox or another box about that size. Think about things for which you would want to say "thank you" to God. Have everyone find an object to represent one or two of these blessings (such as a toy, photograph, can of food...). Place the objects in the box. Each day this week, select one item, talk about what it represents and give thanks together.

**Get out the family photograph albums and share family stories, starting with, "Remember when..." Give thanks for God's loving presence through the years.

March 17th ~ Journey toward Trust

Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18 Psalm 27

Something to think about, talk about or do

Abram and Sarai are elderly when they set out on their journey of a lifetime, yet



God promises that they will have a child. As time goes on, Abram begins to question God. Will God prove trustworthy?

God offers encouragement, telling Abram to look up at the night sky, full of stars. "you will have descendants as many as the stars," God promises.

**Cut out lots of paper stars. These stars

remind us that we are all God's children. Have each person take a bag of stars and encourage one another to leave these reminders of God's love in as many different places as possible. Stars could be fixed to mirrors, put on refrigerators, slipped inside lunch boxes, school bags, sock drawers, and other surprising places.

**Go outside in the evening to look at the stars. Read Genesis 15:1–12, 17–18. Think about God's amazing promise to Abram and Sarai. Think about God's other amazing promises – to love and care for all Creation. Say a prayer of thanks for the

wonder of Creation and God's love.

Sometimes, we invest too much of our energy and money in things that don't last, like material objects. Sometimes, we worry we will be excluded from community because we don't have the money or the talents of others. But the prophet Isaiah has a message for the people: God loves all. The prophet encourages us to seek after God and God's ways above all. God gives something to all who seek – steadfast love.

Together

**Celebrate God's love with a praise procession through the house. Put on some lively worship music. Dance, sing, jump, and give thanks to God.

Accompany the procession with homemade musical instruments such as pot lid cymbals, saucepan drums, plastic containers filled with bottle caps.

**Make a wreath by decorating a circle with heart shapes. Invite younger children to trace the circle shape round and round with a finger. Comment that God's love for

(child's name) is like a circle, it never, ever, ever, ever, ever, ends. You might make this a bedtime ritual this week.

Something to think about, talk about or do

This is a story about finding a home and knowing where we belong. We're all different. Some of us know where our home is all the time, others have to leave home to discover where they belong. This is also a story that often touches hidden sadnesses in our lives — for those of us who never left home in the first place, so never had a party in our honor; for those of us who wait for people we love to come home; for those who have returned home to no welcome; and for those who have been forced to leave home but never wanted to. God's love is like no human love — it is limitless, boundless, and weeps for all.


**Think of those for whom home is so unsafe they have to leave. There are 66 million refugees around the world, people who would desperately like to return home, but who cannot. Life for them, even in our safer communities, is tough. They often struggle to find some of the very necessities of life. Others struggle with learning how to shop, use public transport and other basic activities. This week, make some time to contact a refugee support service in your local area. Ask whether there are some basic needs you may be able to help with.

**Plan a special meal this week to celebrate God's extravagant love. Invite
