From our Pastor:

Dear church,

Welcome to fall! Amid the often-darkened skies of fall in the Puget Sound area comes the opportunity to enjoy the colors of the season—leaves with a mixed palette of reds, yellows, oranges, and browns. Whether it is from a warm place beside a large window or on one of the many walking paths in our area, I encourage you to take notice of the color of this season and know that you are witnessing the creativity of our God. I especially call your attention to this particular sign of God's creativity because our news, our political environment, the wet weather and cool temperatures can lead us to living what I would call "inside lives," lives that can leave us isolated and feeling alone. To notice the beauty of this season is to take in an antidote to our isolationist tendencies and to notice God!

In worship we begin November by observing **All Saints' Day** on November 4th. This happens to be one of my favorite days on the liturgical calendar because it calls us to remember and celebrate those who have shaped us. Worship will include the hymns "For All the Saints" and "I Sing a Song of the Saints of God" and my traditional story-telling sermon is entitled, "Saints I Have Known." Our communion liturgy will include a reading of names of the saints of our lives, which will be gathered from paper included in your worship bulletin. Please join us for this celebration of the saints of the church and the saints who have taught us about life and faith!

On November 18th we invite you to bring your pledge card to worship so we can bless them. Your pledges will form the basis of our 2019 budget and I am grateful for every pledge, every volunteer hour, and every gift of leadership! During the month of November you will be invited by another congregation member to engage in a conversation about our church, your faith, and our vision for the future. I invite your honest feedback and your honest hopes for our church. Our council will be using the information gathered during these conversations to help guide us as we plan for how we can better serve each other and our community.

I also want to put in a plug for folks to join us for **The Table** on the evening of November 18th. This casual worship includes a simple supper (normally soup and salad), a basic liturgy, an interactive and conversational exploration of scripture, and Luke Kreikemeier's gifted musical leadership. We have shifted to an "unplugged" musical format which lends itself to community singing. Join us as we share food, faith, music, and conversation!

Finally, because we are called to live our faith in the world I remind you to vote by November 6^{th} .

A change in items requested by Hopelink

Due to the fact that Hopelink has grown so much over the years, they no longer need the collection of fresh produce for Thanksgiving Baskets that they once did.

Therefore, KIN (Kirkland Interfaith Network) decided that this year, they would follow the process that we at KCC UCC have taken with our 40 Days of Prayer for Children collections and provide the items that Hopelink's clients are unable to purchase with their EBT cards.

The list of items has been divided up among the KIN member churches.

KCC has been asked to bring Laundry Detergent—size 50-64 oz bottles of liquid detergent or boxes of powdered laundry detergent. (not Costco size). Any brand is OK.



This is in addition to the laundry detergent that we have already collected. You can bring your donations any Sunday during the month of November. As an alternative, donations can be given to our Common Cents fund and we will purchase items for you.

Please remember, as with all of our Monthly Mission Projects, your participation is completely voluntary.

Also, we have committed to providing 2 boxes of food for the Nourishing Network School Break Boxes. Due to your generous donations last spring, we have most of the items needed for the 2 boxes and will purchase the fresh produce and missing items with Common Cents Funds.

Skip a regular treat (read: expense) and give the money you save to a charity or cause that is important to you.

*Talk about what this sacrifice means to you with your family or group and brainstorm ideas for other ways to creatively give to others.

Generous God, we have so much to be thankful for – even when we forget it. Help us to give abundantly, whatever that means for each one of us. Amen.

Something to think about, talk about or do

In this week's focus scripture, Jesus shows us how to sacrifice while serving others. He says, "For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth." His truth would lead him to make the ultimate sacrifice for humankind. Thinking about Jesus and the examples of those who serve and sacrifice for the good of others in today's world can inspire us to serve and sacrifice for others as well.

*Read about their lives and sacrifices and then share what you found with your family or group.

Global Ministries missionary visits on November 14th

Kirkland Congregational UCC and Lake Washington Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) are joining together to welcome Loren McGrail to Kirkland on November 14th. We will gather with Rev. McGrail at Lake Washington Christian Church at 7pm to hear about her inspiring work. Rev. McGrail has served two terms with the YWCA of Palestine. This appointment is through the Common Global Ministries Board of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ.



Rev. McGrail is the Communications, Advocacy, and Church Relations Officer for the YWCA of Palestine. She writes and edits newsletters, statements, and Action Alerts. She coordinates the advocacy projects which include: The Fabric of Our Lives, Breaking Down the Wall, The Wise Women Also Came, and The Flight into Egypt. She meets with church groups/delegations. She is also the Advocacy Officer for the Joint Advocacy Initiative (JAI) and edits their on-line newsletter Eye on Palestine and works with the Olive Tree Campaign. She also serves the Church of Scotland as one of their ecumenical partners.



"Tree of Angels" gifts returned to church to be distributed to Attain.

Many of you asked about getting a copy of the press release that the clergy of the GKEP put out in response to the racist flyers posted around Kirkland. Here is the release:

In response to the flyers recently posted in the Kirkland area by supporters of a Neo-Nazi group, the clergy of the Greater Kirkland Ecumenical Parish (GKEP) stand united in affirming the dignity and worth of people of all racial backgrounds, ethnic origins, genders, sexual orientations, religions, and abilities. The posting of flyers of this sort is an affront to the values of our community and our faiths, and we are compelled by our faith to speak out and work to counter the seeds of discord, hatred, fear, and intimidation that these flyers promote.

We are people who are guided by our deep and abiding faith in a loving God, and we find it repugnant that this bigotry and hatred has been brought to our community. Our churches celebrate that Kirkland is made up of people of many racial backgrounds, of people who come from a diversity of countries of origin, and of people who practice many faiths. We believe that we are all created as holy by our God.

Rather than merely ignoring these posters and hoping that racism and hatred will fail to find a foothold in Kirkland, our faith calls us to respond. As such, our faithful response to those who seek to sow hatred in our community is to offer love and compassion to all people. Our faithful response to those who seek to sow division is to open our doors and welcome stranger and friend alike. Our faithful response to those who are inciting fear is to work diligently for peace and justice in our community and our world. We pray that our community can stand united in the effort to meet racism and divisive rhetoric with love.
